

- Based at Durrell Wildlife Park on Jersey in the British Channel Islands



Started in 1975



St Lucia Parrot Start population: 125 Finish population: 2,000 1975-2009



Antiguan Racer *Alsophis antiguae* - CR





- In 1995 just 50 racers remaining on one island
- Five organisations formed the Antiguan Racer Conservation Project (ARCP) in 1995





- Rat eradications on offshore islands
- Biosecurity measures and public education
- Translocation of racers to rat-free islands



Saint Lucia - Offshore Islands

- Saint Lucia whiptail and racer restricted to just 2 and 1 islands respectively
- Partnership with St Lucia Forestry Department and St Lucia National Trust
- 1986 establish safety net population of whiptails in Jersey
- 2011 first successful surveys of racer Est. population 18





Saint Lucia - Offshore Islands

- Invasive goat and rat removal on Rat and Praslin islands
- Whiptail's successfully reintroduced to both islands
- Dennery Island restoration for future reintroduction of whiptails and racers
- Biosecurity protocols revised to increase protection





Saint Lucia - Offshore Islands

- Capacity development including exchanges with Antigua
- Captive breeding programme for analogue species Anguilla Racer established in Jersey in 2014








Saint Lucia – Mainland

- Saint Lucia Iguana
- Population surveys Est < 1,000 adults
- Nest on just 2 beaches





Saint Lucia - Mainland


- Working with Government to address main threats
- Habitat loss unregulated tourism, highway construction, unsustainable land use practices

 Invasive species – predation by dogs, cats, mongoose







Public education and Awareness











- 2002 chytrid hits Dominica
- 2009 chytrid hits Montserrat. 50 frogs evacuated to European zoos

Within 2 years population crashes by 99%







2009 Mountain Chicken Recovery Programme formed



Treatment trials undertaken using anti-fungal agents





- Darwin Initiative project undertaken series of experimental reintroductions to investigate disease dynamics and survival rates
- 2013 developed a 20-year Long Term Recovery Plan for the Mountain Chicken






- Montserrat Galliwasp
 Diploglossus montiserratti Critically Endangered
- 12 confirmed sightings since
 1963 in 1.5Ha area
- Undertook surveys in 2007
 and developed Species Action
 Plan
- Intensive surveys for 3 weeks in 2014 - none found





Cayman Islands

- Grand Cayman Blue Iguana
 Cyclura Lewisi Endangered
- Partner of the Blue Iguana
 Recovery Program since 2004
- Technical advice: monitoring, radio tracking and captive breeding, fundraising, species action planning
- 2005 5 wild individuals
 2014 650 wild individuals
- Only Cyclura downlisted





Cayman Islands

- Sister Islands Rock Iguana
 Cyclura nubila caymenensis
 Critically Endangered
- Initiated project in 2007
- Baseline surveys on population, threats, Species Action Plan
- Technical advice to DOE and National Trust


